<b>SB116</b> pg. 1486	<p>repealing the license requirement for carrying a concealed pistol or revolver.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● This bill increases the length of time for which a license to carry a pistol or revolver is valid.</li> <li>● Allows a person to carry a loaded, concealed pistol or revolver without a license unless such person is otherwise prohibited by New Hampshire statute.</li> <li>● Requires the director of the division of state police to negotiate and enter into agreements with other jurisdictions to recognize in those jurisdictions the validity of the license to carry issued in this state.</li> <li>● Repeals the requirement to obtain a license to carry a concealed pistol or revolver.</li> </ul>

<b>SB190</b> pg. 1487	<p>relative to payment of costs for career and technical education center programs and administration by the department of education.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● This bill modifies the determination of financial responsibility for tuition for career and technical education center programs and the administration of CTE programs by the department of education.</li> <li>● The amendment deletes reference to common calendars among sending school districts and the CTE center.</li> </ul>	
	<p><b>MAJORITY: OUGHT TO PASS WITH AMENDMENT 19-0</b>  <b>REPUBLICANS ON THE COMMITTEE UNANIMOUSLY SUPPORTED OTP/A.</b></p>	
<b>SB227</b> pg. 1487	<p>relative to calculating the cost of an adequate education.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● This bill makes various changes to the method of calculating, distributing, and reporting education grants to municipalities, and repeals the provisions relating to differentiated aid.</li> <li>● Floor amendment 2015-1466h amends the bill conform with the House position on adequate education grants in HB2.</li> </ul>

<b>SB249</b> pg. 1487	relative to the Hampton and Exeter district divisions of the circuit court. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● This bill divides the current Hampton-Exeter district division of the circuit court into 2 divisions and was requested by the judicial branch.</li> </ul>	
	<b>MAJORITY: OUGHT TO PASS 15-1 REPUBLICANS ON THE COMMITTEE SUPPORTED OTP 8-1 WITH 1 ABSENT.</b>	
BILL #		TRANSPORTATION
<b>SB230</b> pg. 1487	relative to speed limits on state roads that are seasonally congested by pedestrian and bicycle traffic. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● This bill permits the department of transportation to establish seasonal speed limits on state roads under certain conditions.</li> <li>● The amendment fixes a conflicting statute reference.</li> </ul>	
	<b>MAJORITY: OUGHT TO PASS WITH AMENDMENT 10-5 REPUBLICANS ON THE COMMITTEE SPLIT 4-4 ON OTP/A WITH 4 ABSENT.</b>	
<b>SB252</b> pg. 1487	establishing a committee to study a number plate commemorating Laconia Motorcycle Week. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● This bill establishes a committee to study a number plate commemorating Laconia Motorcycle Week.</li> </ul>	
	<b>MAJORITY: OUGHT TO PASS 13-2 REPUBLICANS ON THE COMMITTEE SUPPORTED OTP 7-2 WITH 3 ABSENT.</b>	
BILL #		WAYS & MEANS
<b>SB113</b> pg. 1487	relative to video lottery and table gaming. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● This bill establishes the gaming commission and places the lottery commission and racing and charitable gaming commission under its jurisdiction as separate divisions.</li> <li>● Allows for the selection and operation of 2 casinos in New Hampshire, including the operation of video slot machines and table games, subject to certain legislative approvals.</li> <li>● Establishes the gaming enforcement unit in the division of state police.</li> <li>● Distributes proceeds from gross slot machine income and gross table game income to reimburse the gaming regulatory oversight authority for certain expenses and to pay for the operation of the gaming commission.</li> <li>● Distributes a percentage of proceeds from gross slot machine revenue and gross table game revenue to the host community, those communities abutting the host community, the host county, the department of health and human services to support addiction programs to cities and towns under the revenue sharing agreement, and the gaming regulatory fund.</li> <li>● Establishes the gaming regulatory fund.</li> </ul>	
	<b>MAJORITY: OUGHT TO PASS WITH AMENDMENT 11-10 REPUBLICANS ON THE COMMITTEE SUPPORTED OTP/A 9-4.</b>	
<b>SB154</b> pg. 1489	authorizing the department of safety to set fees for motorcycle rider education programs. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● This bill authorizes the department of safety to set fees for residents and nonresidents participating in motorcycle rider education programs and is a request of the department of safety.</li> </ul>	
	<b>MAJORITY: OUGHT TO PASS 19-0 REPUBLICANS ON THE COMMITTEE UNANIMOUSLY SUPPORTED OTP WITH 2 ABSENT.</b>	

<b>SB211</b> pg. 1489	relative to taxation of employee leasing companies under the business enterprise tax. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● This bill allows an employee leasing company and a client company to elect to make the client company solely responsible for paying business enterprise taxes concerning its leased employees and be eligible for credits against such taxes.</li> </ul>
	<b>MAJORITY: OUGHT TO PASS WITH AMENDMENT 19-0</b> <b>REPUBLICANS ON THE COMMITTEE UNANIMOUSLY SUPPORTED OTP/A WITH 2 ABSENT.</b>
